# **Attendance Policy**

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#### 1. Aims

We are committed to meeting our obligation with regards to school attendance through our whole-school culture and ethos that values good attendance, including:

- > Promoting good attendance
- > Reducing absence, including persistent and severe absence
- **>** Ensuring every pupil has access to the full-time education to which they are entitled.
- > Acting early to address patterns of absence.
- > Building strong relationships with families to ensure pupils have the support in place to attend school

We will also promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

## 2. Legislation and Guidance

This policy meets the requirements of the <u>working together to improve school attendance</u> from the Department for Education (DfE), and refers to the DfE's statutory guidance on <u>school attendance</u> <u>parental responsibility measures</u>. These documents are drawn from the following legislation setting out the legal powers and duties that govern school attendance:

- > Part 6 of The Education Act 1996
- > Part 3 of The Education Act 2002
- > Part 7 of The Education and Inspections Act 2006
- > The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006 (and 2010, 2011, 2013, 2016 amendments)
- The Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013

It also refers to:

- > School census guidance
- > Keeping Children Safe in Education
- > Mental health issues affecting a pupil's attendance: guidance for schools

## 3. Roles and Responsibilities

## 3.1 The Governing Body

The governing body is responsible for:

- > Promoting the importance of school attendance across the school's policies and ethos
- ➤ Making sure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties.
- > Regularly reviewing and challenging attendance data
- ➤ Monitoring attendance figures for the whole school
- ➤ Making sure staff receive adequate training on attendance.
- > Holding the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy

#### 3.2 The Headteacher



The headteacher is responsible for:

- > Implementation of this policy at the school
- ➤ Monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors.
- > Supporting staff with monitoring the attendance of individual pupils
- Monitoring the impact of any implemented attendance strategies
- > Issuing fixed-penalty notices, where necessary

#### 3.3 The Designated Senior Leader Responsible for Attendance

The designated senior leader is responsible for:

- ➤ Leading attendance across the school
- > Offering a clear vision for attendance improvement
- > Evaluating and monitoring expectations and processes
- > Having an oversight of data analysis
- > Devising specific strategies to address areas of poor attendance identified through data.
- > Building relationships with parents/carers to discuss and tackle attendance issues.
- > Creating intervention reintegration plans in partnership with pupils and their parents/carers
- > Delivering targeted intervention and support to pupils and families

The designated senior leader responsible for attendance is the Headteacher and can be contacted via the school office on 0208 873 3337 and/or email the school office on info@edisonprimary.org

## 3.4 The Attendance officer

The school attendance Officer is responsible for:

- ➤ Monitoring and analysing attendance data (see section 7)
- > Benchmarking attendance data to identify areas of focus for improvement.
- > Providing regular attendance reports to school staff and reporting concerns about attendance to the designated senior leader responsible for attendance and the headteacher
- > Working with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence.
- > Advising the headteacher/deputy headteacher (authorised by the headteacher) when to issue fixed-penalty notices. The attendance officer is Mrs M Pallan-Sharma and can be contacted via 0208 873 3337 and/or email <a href="mailto:info@edisonprimary.org">info@edisonprimary.org</a>

#### 3.5 Class Teachers

Class teachers are responsible for recording attendance on a daily basis, using the correct codes, and submitting this information to the school office by completing the register on Arbor.

#### 3.6 School Office Staff

School office staff will:

> Take calls from parents/carers about the pupil's absence on a day-to-day basis and record it on the school system.



> Transfer calls from parents/carers to the school attendance officer in order to provide them with more detailed support on attendance.

## 3.7 Parents/Carers

Parents/carers are expected to:

- > Make sure their child attends on time every day
- > Call the school to report their child's absence before 8.30am on the day of the absence (and each subsequent day of absence) and advise when they are expected to return.
- > Provide the school with at least two emergency contact numbers for their child.
- **>** Ensure that, where possible, appointments for their child are made outside of the school day.

#### 3.8 Pupils

Pupils are expected to:

- > Attend school on time every day
- > Arrive ready to start learning.

## 4. Recording attendance

#### 4.1 Attendance Register

We will keep an attendance register, and place all pupils onto this register.

We will take our attendance register at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark whether every pupil is:

- > Present
- **>** Educated of Site
- > Absent Illness
- ➤ Absent Unauthorised
- > Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances.
- > Family Holiday Agreed
- > Family Holiday Not Agreed
- > Medical/Dental Appointment
- **>** Late
- > Other Authorised Absence
- > Religious Observance

Any amendment to the attendance register will include:

- > The original entry
- > The amended entry
- > The reason for the amendment
- > The date on which the amendment was made.
- The name and position of the person who made the amendment.



See appendix 1 for the DfE attendance codes.

We will also record:

- > For pupils of compulsory school age, whether the absence is authorised or not.
- The nature of the activity if a pupil is attending an approved educational activity.
- > The nature of circumstances where a pupil is unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances.

We will keep every entry on the attendance register for 3 years after the date on which the entry was made.

Pupils must arrive in school by 8.35am on each school day.

The register for the first session will be taken at 8.45am and will be kept open until 9.00am. The register for the second session will be taken from 12.30pm and will be kept open until 13.45pm.

#### 4.2 Unplanned Absence

The pupil's parent/carer must notify the school of the reason for the absence on the first day of an unplanned absence by 8.30am or as soon as practically possible by calling the school office staff (see also Section 7).

Parents need to call the school office on 020 8873 3337 and select Option 1. When leaving a message, the parent needs to clearly state the child's name, their class, and what the specific reason for the absence is, eg high temperature. Parents can also email the school with the absence details, to <a href="mailto:info@edisonprimary.org">info@edisonprimary.org</a>

We will mark absence due to illness as authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

Where the absence is longer than three days or there are doubts about the authenticity of the illness, the school will ask for medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

## 4.3 Planned absence

Attending a medical or dental appointment will be counted as authorised provided the pupil's parent/carer notifies the school 24 hours in advance of the appointment.

Parents/carers need to email the school on <u>info@edisonprimary.org</u> 24 hours in advance, attaching proof of the appointment.

However, we encourage parents/carers to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary.

The pupil's parent/carer must also apply for other types of term-time absence as far in advance as possible of the requested absence. Go to section 5 to find out which term-time absences the school can authorise.

#### 4.4 Lateness and punctuality

A pupil who arrives late:

- Before the register has closed will be marked as present, using the appropriate code.
- After the register has closed will be marked as late, using the appropriate code.



The School identifies and responds to ongoing punctuality issues by:

- Speak to the parents face to face when dropping pupil to school.
- Sending a letter to the parent after 3 or more lates
- A meeting is set up with the parents to discuss how the school can support them to reduce the number of lates.

## 4.5 Following up unexplained absence.

Where any pupil we expect to attend school does not attend, or stops attending, without reason, the school will:

- > Email, text or call the pupil's parent/carer on the morning of the first day of unexplained absence to ascertain the reason. If the school cannot reach any of the pupil's emergency contacts, the school may contact social services and the police.
- > Identify whether the absence is approved or not.
- ➤ Identify the correct attendance code to use and input it as soon as the reason for absence is ascertained this will be no later than 5 working days after the session.
- > Call the parent/carer on each day that the absence continues without explanation to ensure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary. If absence continues, the school will consider involving an education welfare officer.

## 4.6 Reporting to parents/carers

The school will regularly inform parents/carers about their child's attendance and absence levels for example via, letters sent once a term showing attendance for the previous term and discussions with parents at parent's meetings.

Letters will be reported as below:

	<u>Percentage</u>	<u>Comment</u>	<u>Your</u> <u>Child's</u> <u>Attendance</u>
Green	97 – 100%	Your child's attendance meets our school expectation. You have supported your child with achieving the best possible outcomes in life.  If your child has achieved 100% - well done!	
Amber	94 – 96.9%	Stage 2: Your child's attendance is a cause of concern. We know that this may be due to illness or other authorised absences, but we hope that by bringing this to your attention now, will help you and your child.	
	90 – 93.9%	Stage 1: Your child's attendance is a cause for concern. At this stage, we will need to arrange a formal meeting to support you and your child with improving this.	
Red	90% and below	Your child's attendance is far from our expectations, and they are now on the <b>persistent absentees list</b> . We will need to meet formally and draw up an action plan together. Unless rapid improvement is made you will be flagged up to our EWO and your case may be referred on further, which can also lead to possible fines	



## 5. Authorised and unauthorised absence

## **5.1** Approval for term-time absence

The headteacher will only grant a leave of absence to a pupil during term time if they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'. A leave of absence is granted at the headteacher's discretion, including the length of time the pupil is authorised to be absent for.

Exceptional circumstances are unlikely to include;

- a. Leaving early to go on a family trip/holiday or similar
- b. Going to a family wedding

The term exceptional will be considered on an individual, case by case, basis. Part of the consideration will be the impact the potential absence is likely to have on the individual student's education. The headteacher's decision is final in relation to authorising exceptional absences.

Any request should be submitted as soon as it is anticipated and, where possible, at least 3 weeks before the absence, and in accordance with any leave of absence request form, accessible from the school office. The headteacher may require evidence to support any request for leave of absence.

Valid reasons for authorised absence include:

- ➤ Illness and medical/dental appointments (see sections 4.2 and 4.3 for more detail)
- ➤ Religious observance where the day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parents/carers belong. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents'/carers' religious body to confirm whether the day is set apart.
- > Traveller pupils travelling for occupational purposes this covers Roma, English and Welsh gypsies, Irish and Scottish travellers, showmen (fairground people) and circus people, bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and new travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a traveller family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school, but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision.
- > Study leave to attend exams at other venues.

#### 5.2 Legal sanctions

The school or local authority can fine parents/carers for the unauthorised absence of their child from school, where the child is of compulsory school age.

If issued with a fine, or penalty notice, each parent/carer must pay £60 within 21 days or £120 within 28 days. The payment must be made directly to the local authority.

Penalty notices can be issued by a headteacher, local authority officer or the police.

The decision on whether or not to issue a penalty notice maybe consider:

- > The number of unauthorised absences occurring within a rolling academic year
- One-off instances of irregular attendance, such as holidays taken in term time without permission
- > Where an excluded pupil is found in a public place during school hours without a justifiable reason

If the payment has not been made after 28 days, the local authority can decide whether to prosecute or withdraw the notice.

## 6. Strategies for promoting attendance



Edison Primary School will be using the strategies below to promote attendance:

- Notice board in the school hall showing attendance figures for the whole school, the best class and the children with 'Top 10' attendance
- > 100% attendance certificates presented to pupils at the end of each term
- Best attendance trophy for the class with the highest attendance for the week.

## 7. Attendance monitoring

#### 7.1 Monitoring attendance

The school will:

- > Monitor attendance and absence data half-termly, termly and yearly across the school and at an individual pupil level
- > Identify whether or not there are particular groups of children whose absences may be a cause for concern.

Pupil-level absence data will be collected each term and published at national and local authority level through the DfE's school absence national statistics releases. The underlying school-level absence data is published alongside the national statistics. The school will compare attendance data to the national average and share this with the governing board.

#### 7.2 Analysing attendance.

The school will:

- Analyse attendance and absence data regularly to identify pupils or cohorts that need additional support with their attendance and use this analysis to provide targeted support to these pupils and their families.
- > Look at historic and emerging patterns of attendance and absence, and then develop strategies to address these patterns.

## 7.3 Using data to improve attendance.

The school will:

- > Provide regular attendance reports to class teachers, and other school leaders, to facilitate discussions with pupils and families.
- > Use data to monitor and evaluate the impact of any interventions put in place in order to modify them and inform future strategies.

## 7.4 Reducing persistent and severe absence.

Persistent absence is where a pupil misses 10% or more of school, and severe absence is where a pupil misses 50% or more of school.

The school will:

- > Use attendance data to find patterns and trends of persistent and severe absence.
- > Hold regular meetings with the parents/carers of pupils who the school (and/or local authority) considers to be vulnerable, or are persistently or severely absent, to discuss attendance and engagement at school.
- > Provide access to wider support services to remove the barriers to attendance.



> Will contact the parent/carer to arrange a meeting to discuss the reason for absences and solution going forward.

## 8. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed as guidance from the local authority or DfE is updated, and as a minimum 2 years by the School Attendance Officer. At every review, the policy will be approved by the full governing board.

# **Appendix 1: Attendance Codes**

The following codes are taken from the DfE's guidance on school attendance.

Code	Definition	Scenario
1	Present (am)	Pupil is present at morning registration
\	Present (pm)	Pupil is present at afternoon registration
L	Late arrival	Pupil arrives late before register has closed
В	Off-site educational activity	Pupil is at a supervised off-site educational activity approved by the school
D	Dual registered	Pupil is attending a session at another setting where they are also registered
J	Interview	Pupil has an interview with a prospective employer/educational establishment
Р	Sporting activity	Pupil is participating in a supervised sporting activity approved by the school
v	Educational trip or visit	Pupil is on an educational visit/trip organised, or approved, by the school
W	Work experience	Pupil is on a work experience placement

С	Authorised leave of absence	Pupil has been granted a leave of absence due to exceptional circumstances
E	Excluded	Pupil has been excluded but no alternative provision has been made
