Introduce enhanced cleaning regimes, e.g., additional cleaning focussing on highly touched points and shared equipment. 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2.	Spread/contraction of COVID-19 due to an individual developing COVID19 systems or has a positive test.	 Where an individual exhibits symptom(s) during the school day, the individual will be escorted to the studio to isolate them from the main population until additional medical assistance can be gained. This may be 111 support, an ambulance or until they leave the site to self-isolate; The door to the isolation room will be closed (where possible). The isolation room is suitably ventilated by opening a window or by mechanical ventilation. PPE is used if close contact is necessary. Staff or contractors carrying out the area clean should be provided with a minimum of disposable gloves, aprons, mop heads or paper towels. All building users advised re monitoring their own health, reporting symptoms and self-isolating. First aiders required to assist this person will wear full PPE including, apron, gloves, mask and visor. First aiders have completed appropriate training for 'donning and doffing' PPE. PPE is disposed of in accordance with NHS COVID19 waste management guidance; principles of cleaning after a case has left the setting or area.		
3.	Student or member of staff becoming unwell with COVID19 and being hospitalised.		The school will seek public health advice if a student or staff member is admitted to a hospital with COVID19. Hospitalisation could indicate increased severity of illness or a new variant of concern. CEV staff that have received personal advice from their specialist or clinician on additional precautions continue to follow that advice. The school follows the specific guidance for pregnant employees.
